



MARIGOLDS

When talking about marigolds, the clue is in the name.

Marigolds were once only available in a warm gold colour - useful for those who didn't have the means to place gold coins at the altar of the Virgin Mary as they could place marigolds there instead.

Originally this flower was a warming gold colour, which came in quite useful when it came to worshipping the Virgin Mary - if you didn't have enough money to place gold coins at her altar you could instead choose the flowers of marigolds.


Very quickly the flower earned its name from two old English words – Mary and Golde.

Don't worry if you're after a brighter colour, the flower has been developed and you can also get it in white, yellow and red varieties too, even though traditional golden orange colour is still one of the most common choices today.

This flower has certainly been a useful bloom over the centuries. Marigolds have antiseptic, anti-inflammatory and antioxidant properties, where extracts from the flower have been used on rashes, wounds and burns. Not only is it powerful, but it is edible too!

It's no wonder the famous herbalist of 1653, Nicholas Culpepper, called Marigolds a 'herb of the sun'.

A VIEW BEHIND BARS - LIVELINESS AND LIVES LOST



It was obvious as soon as I entered the gym, expectant for my weekly lunchtime visit, that I wouldn't be hopping on the cross trainer that day. Twenty-four sweaty prisoners were going all out on the treadmills in a charity event to raise money for the local hospice. Due to the limited number of machines, they were in relays of two or three men, running hard for two minutes before swapping, to eventually cover thirty-six miles in each team.

Martin and Lucas were dripping, not to put too fine a point on it, but Martin nodded to the top of the machine where, propped up in his eyeline was a verse from Ecclesiastes about making the most of the time and enduring in difficulty. It gave me a buzz to know that the idea of living out your faith in all aspects of life had made it onto a scruffy bit of paper at the top of a treadmill to keep him going.

The staff effort to raise money for the same hospice involved several of us joining a 'three reservoir ramble' on the Saturday. 'Ramble' conjures up ideas of strolling gently and taking in the views, whilst chatting along and getting to know one another better. Instead, several hundred people managed half an hour in drizzle before the deluge began and we strode out for two and a half hours in a constant downpour, and avoiding bow waves from people crashing through puddles ahead of us. I think it was a lovely route but couldn't quite see, between the mist and the drips running into my eyes. Sunday was gorgeous!

My eyes were opened in a different way during the counter-corruption training. How many staff have been sacked or, worse, given prison sentences, for falling into collusion with prisoners! It doesn't begin that way. A bit of information about personal circumstances carelessly dropped, leads to people 'on the out' getting to know things from their mates inside and perhaps making demands hard to resist. An officer of our own was somehow persuaded to be a carrier for some drugs a few years back. Perhaps he, like others we heard about, was threatened and felt he couldn't back out.

Then there are those who deliberately take a paid job as staff for some months before using their position to ferry things back and forth, and others who are 'groomed' by prisoners who give them compliments or find them to be a good listening ear when they are feeling low, and then turn, with people too scared for their families or personal lives, to speak out. There are horror stories that remind me where I'm working when I become too used to things.

It has been lively of late, not only in terms of sport or the possibilities of corruption. Whilst talking to someone on the Wing, there was a huge bang just opposite, followed by shouting, officers running and men being

shuffled behind their doors and locked down. It didn't end well. The prisoner had barricaded himself in with his table, which was eventually shoved aside but negotiation wasn't going to work once the staff were inside and he proceeded to wrench his sink from the wall and cut his wrists with a shard of broken pottery.

There's a curious mix of calmness and mayhem at these times. The trained officers know how to try to de-escalate things but around them will be a crowd forming of those who need to be ready to restrain a man or treat wounds or get others out of the way. This one was helped, housed somewhere else and the Works people were called to fix yet another beaten-up cell.

Slightly less chaotic but still needing careful handling was the 'incident at height' which causes the whole prison to come to a standstill in terms of normal activity, all because of a man who climbed up a tree. Frustration comes out in all sorts of ways.

Lives lost, rather than lives lived at full speed, is also a regular theme. Scott found out that his brother had been in an accident and the family were discussing whether his life support would be turned off. Scott was desperate. We managed to get him out to see him and he waited for the call the following day that would say life had ended.

Yet Gary's mum is not (quite) so close to death. She has made a rapid decline due to a tumour only diagnosed a few months ago. Until a couple of weeks ago Gary was seeing her on visits, when his dad and sister could bring her. It has been a quick shift in her capacity. This week he was taken out to see her in her home, knowing it would be for the last time.

Lives lost – and found, perhaps. One of the young men I've seen regularly over the year or so that he's been with us, has moved on to a Cat D prison. His parents sent me a 'thank you' card to say how pleased they were that he had had someone from the chaplaincy to talk to. He has changed, for the good, and I'm delighted. Maybe he'll make it out with new hope and direction. The Good shepherd looks for that one sheep that's gone astray and rejoices when it's found.

And Marcus has got a new job. He's on the 'paint party'. A broadly-accented Scot is contracted to paint the prison. Forth Bridge comes to mind. With his team of one or maybe two trusted men, he works his way round in magnolia (or occasionally a bit of white gloss for the bars or blue for the outside doors) before starting again. Marcus is happy - and is recognisable by the state of his work trousers, which are already stiff with paint splashes. He has a purpose now. Life continues - in all its varied forms.
